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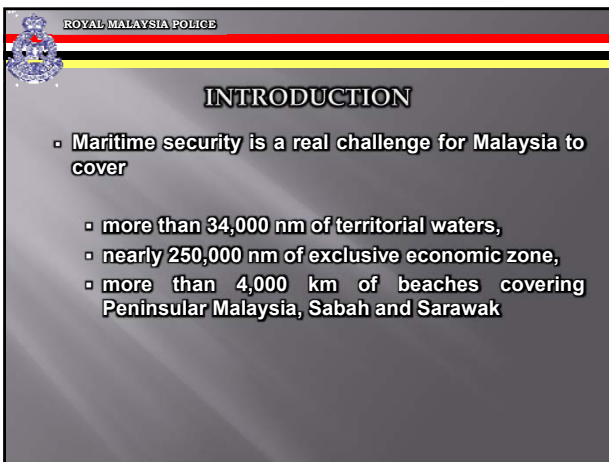

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NO	DATE	LOCATION	KIDNAPPING INCIDENT
1.	23 APR 2000	Pulau Sipadan, Semporna, SABAH	18 members of ABU SAYYAF GROUP(ASG) headed by GALIB ANDANG @ Commander ROBOT and MUJUB SUSUKAN kidnapped 21 people (9 Malaysians dan 12 foreigners) and taken to Patikul, JOLO.  All victims were eventually released by stages over a period of nearly 3 months from 22 June to 9 Sept 2000.
2.	10 SEP 2000	Pulau Pandanan, Semporna, SABAH	3 Malaysians were kidnapped for ransom by a group of 9 ASG members headed by LANDASAN OMAR. The victims were taken to Panamao, JOLO.  On 25 Oct 2000, the 3 victims escaped during a shoot-out incident between ASG and ATF.

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3.	5 OCT 2003	Borneo Paradise Resort, Kunak, SABAH	10 armed men kidnapped 6 resort employees, 3 Indonesians and 3 Filipinos.  They were eventually released on 23 May 2004.
4.	10 MAC 2005	Pulau Matakang, Semporna, SABAH	A tug boat travelling from Kalimantan, INDONESIA to SANDAKAN were robbed and 3 Indonesian crews kidnapped.
5.	8 FEB 2010	Pulau Sebangkat, Semporna, SABAH	2 Malaysians were kidnapped by 7 armed men from Southern Philippines. The victims were handed over to ASG for demand of ransom.
6.	7 MAY 2011	Pulau Jolo, Southern Philippines	A Malaysian was kidnapped by ASG and released on 12 May 2102 after payment made.

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7.	5 OCT 2011	Lok Angki, Sitangkai, Southern Philippines	A Malaysian was kidnapped by 4 armed men and released 4 months later in mid February 2013.
8.	14 NOV 2012	Kg. Tandu, Tungku, LAHAD DATU	A group of 10 armed men kidnapped 2 Malaysians and taken to South Philippines. 1 was released on 4 August 2013 whilst the other was killed on 13 Oct 2013.
9.	15 NOV 2013	Pulau Pom Pom, SEMPORNA	A Taiwanese man was shot dead by Sub-Commander ASG, MARAJAN HAJIRI whilst a Taiwanese woman was kidnapped by KFRG and ASG.  The woman was rescued on 21 Dec 2013 by the Philippines Army.
10.	2 APR 2014	Singgamata Adventure Reef Resort, SEMPORNA	A Filipino and a Chinese men were kidnapped and taken to Pulau Jolo. Both victims were released end of May 2014.

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11.	6 MAY 2014	Pulau Baik, Silam, LAHAD DATU	A Chinese national was kidnapped by KFRG and handed over to ASG in Jolo.  He was released on 10 JUL 2014.
12.	16 JUN 2014	Kg. Sapang, KUNAK	A fish farm owner was kidnapped by the Muktadil Brothers:- (a) BADONG MUKTADIL (b) GADAFI MUKTADIL (c) NIKSON MUKTADIL (d) MENDRAS MUKTADIL  The victim was handed over to ASG in Bukit Taran, Indanan, JOLO on 17 JUN 2014.  The victim was released on 10 Dec 2014.
13.	12 JUL 2014	Pulau Mabul, SEMPORNA	A Police Marine Constable based in SEMPORNA was kidnapped by 8 members of ASG/KFRG and taken to Jolo. He was released on 7 March 2015.  Another Marine Corporal was shot dead for resisting.

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14.	15 MAY 2015	Ocean King Seafood, SANDAKAN	7 armed men from ASG and KFRG kidnapped a restaurant owner and a customer.  The victims were handed over to ASG in Jolo and negotiation is still in progress.
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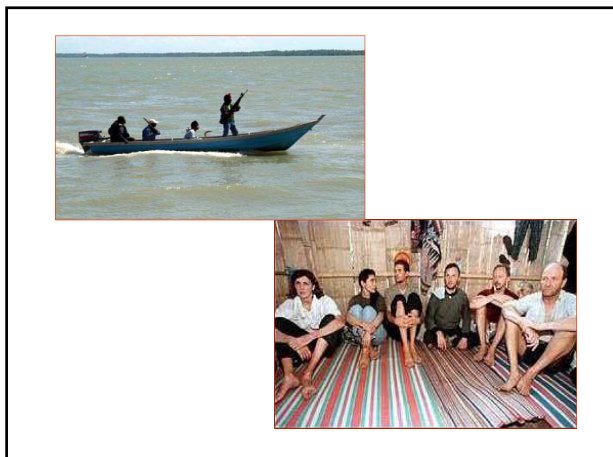
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JAN - SEP 2015, 34 intelligence received on kidnapping attempts by KFRG and ASG in East Coast of Sabah.

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### ARMED ROBBERY CASES

- ❑ JAN – SEP 2015, 8 cases of armed robbery on high seas in East Coast of Sabah:
  - > KUNAK (4 cases)
  - > SEMPORNA (2 cases)
  - > LAHAD DATU (1 case)
  - > BELURAN (1 case)
- ❑ Latest incident on 1 SEP 2015 near Pulau Jambongan, BELURAN, a fishing boat was robbed by 10 armed robbers.
- ❑ The armed robbers ran away with RM7,000.00 worth of shrimps/prawns and diesel towards the Philippines waters
- ❑ This incident happened during curfew hours around 2000hrs.

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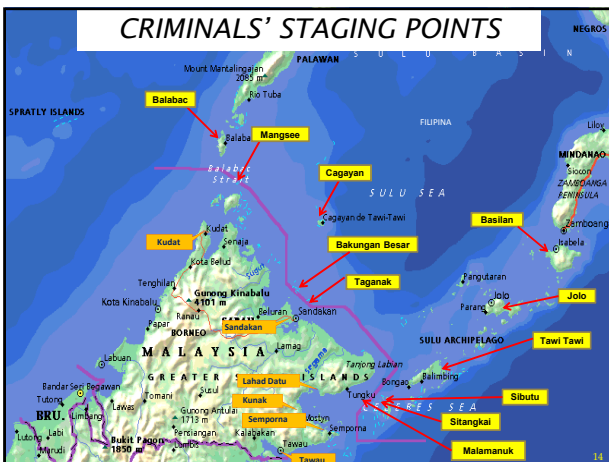
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### CRIMINALS' STAGING POINTS

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## SMUGGLING OF MIGRANTS

- ▣ Cases of interest:
  - 2 boat landings in Langkawi on 10 & 11 may 2015
  - Recent arrest on syndicates involved in smuggling of Bangladesh migrants
  - Indonesian Illegal Immigrants

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## BOAT LANDINGS IN LANGKAWI

- ▣ On 10 may 2015, 2 boats loaded with migrants from country of origin landed on Langkawi Island, Kedah.
- ▣ Boat 1 - 3 suspects charged on 25 June 2015 for involvement in smuggling of migrants under ATIP-SOM 2007. Hearing of case for boat owner on 15 Sept 2015 and 21 Oct 2015, 3 suspects currently detained in prison.



CONFISCATED BOAT FERRYING 287 MIGRANTS IN LANGKAWI (10 MAY 2015)

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## MODUS OPERANDI

- The migrants were transported by small boats to international waters



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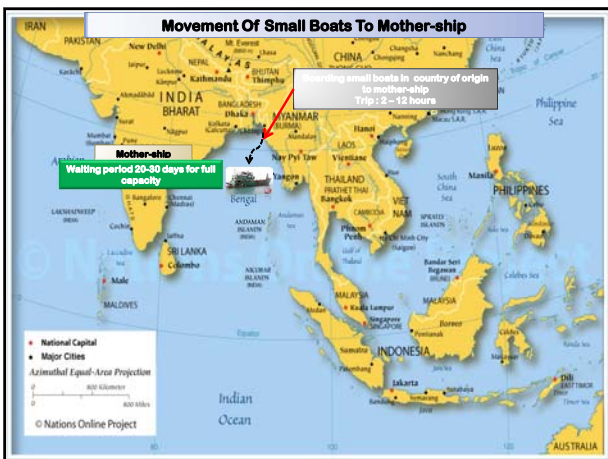
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- The trips took between 2 – 12 hours on high seas
- Migrants were transferred into a bigger ship (mother-ship) temporarily anchored in international waters
- Mother-ship could accommodate up to 2,000 migrants

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- ❑ Migrants would be segregated on mother-ship for receiving syndicate agents in Malaysia or Thailand
- ❑ Average waiting time on mother-ship : 20 - 30 days for full capacity of 2,000 people
- ❑ During this period, the agents would contact the migrants family demanding USD 1,000 – USD 2,000 for travel expenses to destination country
- ❑ Migrants who failed to make payments would be tortured and starved to death.

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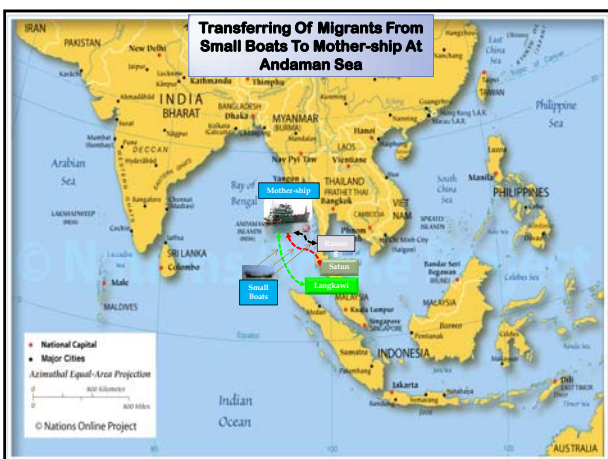
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- Migrants were separated in 2 categories :
  - Those who have made full payment (black group)
    - Freed upon reaching destination
  - Those who have not fully paid or yet to make any payment (red group)
    - To stay back until full payment made

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- Migrants would be transported to staging points at:
  - i) Ranong,
  - ii) Satun,
  - iii) Hatyai,
  - iv) Sadao,
  - v) Golok, and
  - vi) Transit camps located at Thailand - Malaysia border
- At every staging points, the migrants were forced to make additional payments until they crossed into Malaysia

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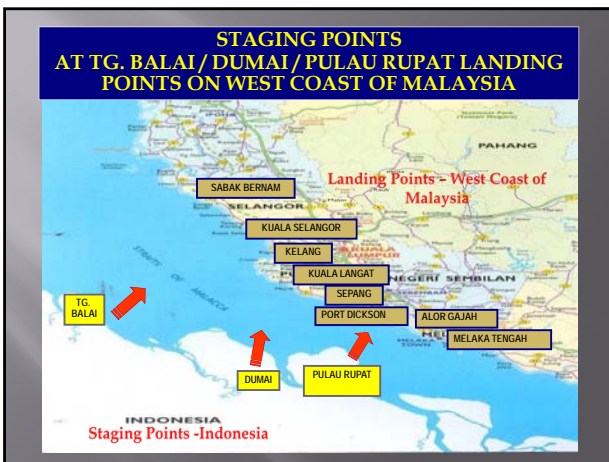
