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DG MOVE study: Scope of the study

Collect data regarding piracy and armed robbery on worldwide scale and disseminate useful information to EC, shipping actors and engaged stakeholders, on a daily basis
The study needs to address 3 key questions:

- □ How best to develop long term anti-piracy/ armed robbery strategy?
- ☐ How to enhance the current information flow to get a daily overall situation awareness and improve maritime picture of piracy environment ?
- □ How to develop a sustainable solution to the collation and dissemination of piracy information, whatever the area ?

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DG MOVE study: a 2 steps approach

2nd step: Towards a common long term solution

- ☐ Identify constraints and viability factors, including the causes of under-reporting and its effect on data reliability
- □ Edit recommendations on the ways to develop a common operating picture to collate, analyze and disseminate "piracy" information
- ☐ Enhance the flow and exchange of information with the relevant authorities and other actors engaged in protecting the commercial shipping and/or fishing activities (including knowledge and tools and promotion communication of the solution)

General recommendations towards a sustainable solution to collate, analyze and disseminate piracy information to EU and international stakeholders on a daily basis

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High level requirements(1/2)

Reg.1: Monitor the theater of operations of maritime piracy

- Continuously monitor the locations and the shift of prone areas, the patterns and modus operandi of pirates, victims, impacts and response
- > Early detection / warning of change in the global picture, strange cinematic patterns or suspicious vessels cases
- Set up anti-piracy tools like registration process, voyage planning process, mobility monitoring, incident reporting, data sharing

Req. 2 Access & assess the regional context of challenges and forecast future risks

- > Access to the information in a complex regional environment
- Make the distinction between pirate ships, private ships and governmental ships
- Follow up on the use & equipment of embarked security guards (public & private)
- Address other thematic issues, any unlawful use of the Maritime Global Domains like oil pollution, illegal fishing ...

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High level requirements (2/2)

Req. 3 Intervene in regional configuration through international cooperation

- > Build ashore factors of security with ad hoc means
- Identify possible solutions for regional maritime security cooperations/regimes involving both regional and extra-regional countries (cf. funds and projects)
- Anticipate, deter, prevent, protect and respond to such behaviour (e.g. In the following application domains: maritime domain awareness, security & defence...)
